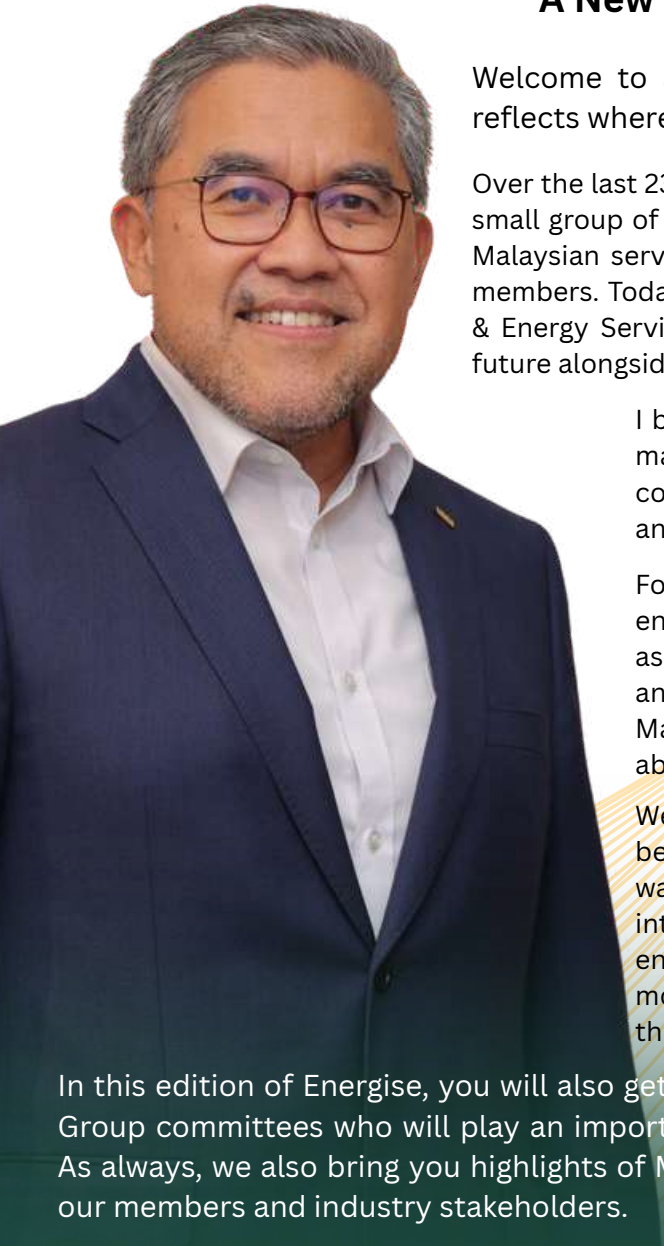

From the Desk of the President

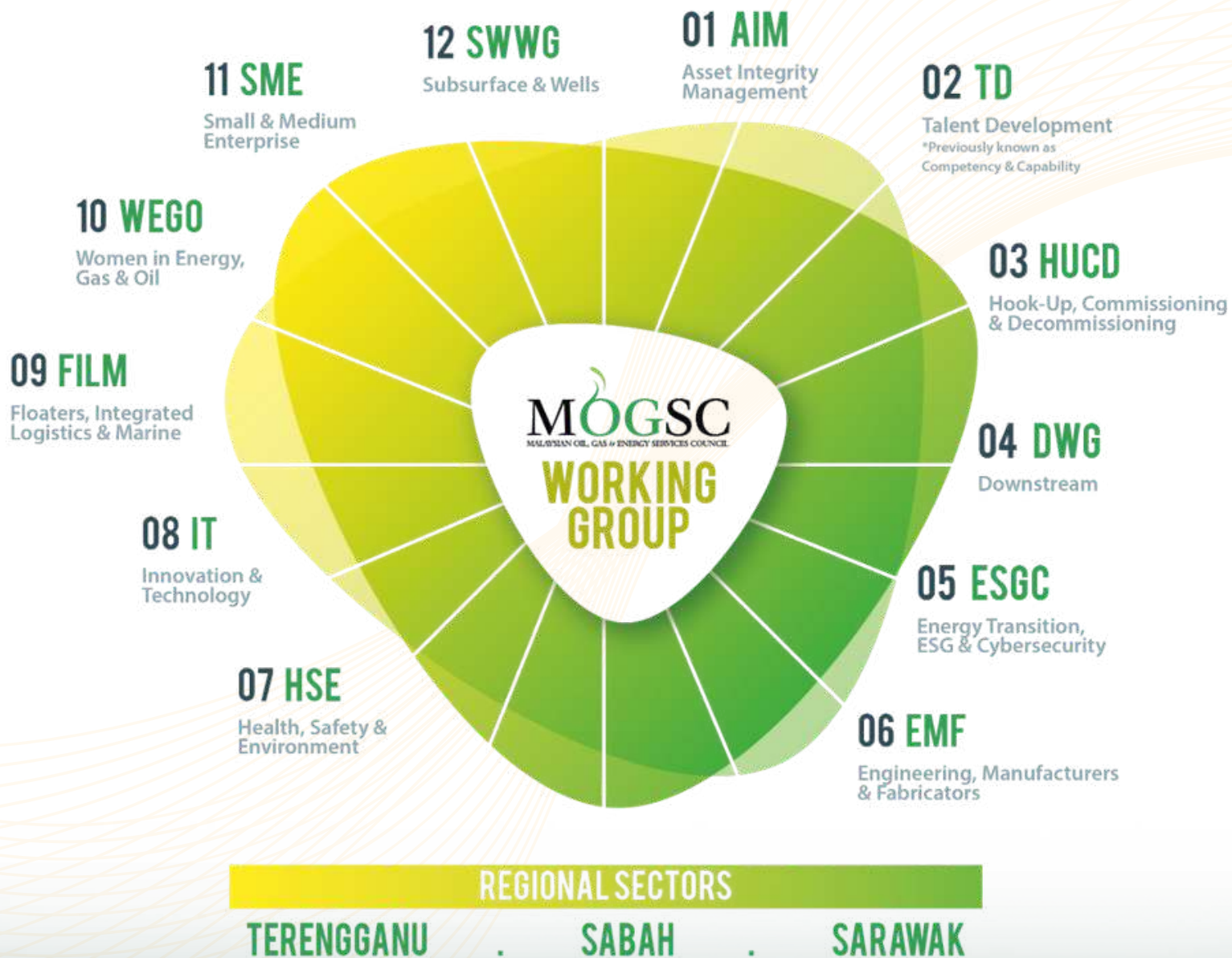

The MOGSC EXCO 2026–2028 is committed to strengthening Malaysia's OGSE industry through four key focus areas: strengthening the OGSE ecosystem by promoting fairer contracting and stronger industry collaboration; growing industry capabilities through talent, skills and TVET development; building global champions by enhancing the competitiveness and international reach of Malaysian OGSE companies; and accelerating energy transition by creating opportunities in innovation, technology, decarbonisation and emerging energy sectors. Together, these priorities aim to position the Malaysian OGSE industry for sustainable, resilient and future-ready growth.



For the 2026–2028 term, MOGSC’s Working Groups bring together industry experts and member companies across key areas of Malaysia’s oil, gas and energy services (OGSE) ecosystem.

The 12 Working Groups focus on specialised industry priorities, ranging from Asset Integrity Management, Talent Development, HUC&D, Downstream, Energy Transition & ESG, Engineering & Fabrication, HSE, Innovation & Technology, FLIM, Women in Energy, Gas & Oil, SME development, and Subsurface & Wells.

MOGSC Hold Its 23rd Annual General Meeting and Announces New ExCo for The 2026-2028 Term

The 23rd MOGSC Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on 29 April 2026 at the Merbau Ballroom, Crowne Plaza Kuala Lumpur, commencing at 2.00 PM. The AGM was attended by 380 guests, comprising of 192 corporate members, 9 associate members, along with representatives from key industry agencies including PETRONAS, Malaysia Petroleum Resources Corporation (MPRC), Malaysian Oilfield Services Vendors Association (MOSVA), and Malaysian Oil and Gas Engineering Council (MOGEC). The event was emceed by Ellina Badri from Malaysia Petroleum Resources Corporation (MPRC).

The strong turnout reflected continued member engagement and active participation in shaping the direction of the Malaysian oil, gas, and energy services industry. As the Council's key governance and decision-making platform, the AGM provides members with the opportunity to reflect on the year's progress, review key achievements, and collectively shape the strategic direction of the OGSE industry moving forward.

AGM Proceedings

The meeting commenced with the President's Address, which reflected on the Council's journey, highlighted key developments in the industry, and outlined priorities for strengthening the OGSE ecosystem moving forward. The agenda for the 23rd Annual General Meeting included the following items:

- Confirmation of the minutes of the 22nd MOGSC Annual General Meeting
- Presentation of the Executive Committee Report for the 2025/2026 session
- Presentation of the Treasurer's Report, Auditor's Report, and the Audited Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2025

- Reappointment of the external auditor for the ensuing year

- Consideration of proposed amendments to the Constitution

MOGSC Annual Report 2025/2026

The meeting continued with the presentation of the MOGSC Annual Report 2025/2026 by the Honorary Secretary, highlighting the Council's key initiatives, industry engagements, programmes, and milestones achieved throughout the year. This was followed by the presentation and adoption of the Audited Financial Statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2025, reflecting MOGSC's commitment to transparency, accountability, and strong financial governance under the stewardship of the Treasury.

Dissolution of MOGSC Exco Term 2024-2026

The AGM also marked the formal dissolution of the 14 Executive Committee members serving the 2024-2026 term. The outgoing Exco members were acknowledged and appreciated for their dedication, time, and commitment over the past two years in serving MOGSC and the industry. Their collective efforts contributed to numerous key achievements and initiatives that supported the continued growth and development of the oil, gas, and energy services sector.

Dissolution of MOGSC Exco Term 2024-2026

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MOGSC Exco Election 2026–2028

A key highlight of the 23rd MOGSC AGM 2026 was the Exco Election for the 2026–2028 term, which determined the new leadership team entrusted to steer the Council for the next two years. This election reflects MOGSC's continued commitment to democratic governance, active member participation, and leadership continuity within the OGSE community. A total of 17 candidates contested for the Exco positions. The election process was facilitated by the appointed Auditor, with the presence of two representatives from MPRC as observers to ensure transparency and good governance. A total of 192 corporate members exercised their voting rights, fulfilling their responsibility in shaping the future leadership of MOGSC for the upcoming term.

The meeting concluded with the announcement of the newly elected MOGSC Exco for the 2026–2028 term, followed by the recognition and celebration of the successful candidates. Congratulations were extended to all elected Exco members for being entrusted with this important responsibility. They are expected to carry out their duties with integrity, commitment, and diligence in serving the Council and delivering value to MOGSC members. The new leadership is also encouraged to continue strengthening the industry and advancing initiatives that benefit the broader oil, gas, and energy services community.

From Dialogue to Action: MOGSC Tackles Industry Payment Challenges

On 13 May 2026, leadership representatives from The Malaysian Oil, Gas & Energy Services Council (MOGSC) continued their member engagement initiative with a visit to Protankgrüp, hosted by Esham Salam and Hafie Esham.

The engagement reflects one of MOGSC's key election commitments strengthening member engagement through direct dialogue, listening to industry concerns, and gaining first-hand insight into the challenges faced by members.

A key topic discussed during the session was the long-standing issue of late and non-payment within the industry, aligned with one of MOGSC's immediate priorities: Fix Cash Flow & Stop the Payment Games.

While the issue is not new, industry stakeholders acknowledged that delayed payment practices have gradually become normalised within parts of the ecosystem. Such practices continue to place significant strain on cash flow, particularly for SMEs, affecting project delivery, operational sustainability, and overall industry resilience.

Among the practical solutions discussed was the potential appointment of an independent third party to collect and analyse industry payment behaviour, including invoice ageing and Days Sales Outstanding (DSO). The initiative aims to provide greater transparency and objective benchmarking of payment practices across the industry. The discussion also highlighted the importance of strengthening contractual terms and conditions for subcontractors to better safeguard against non-payment risks.

MOGSC believes that greater transparency can help drive stronger accountability and encourage a healthier payment culture, where prompt payment reflects professionalism, integrity, and responsible industry leadership.

The Council expressed its appreciation to Esham Salam and Hafie Esham for the warm hospitality, open discussion, and shared commitment towards improving the sustainability and long-term health of the industry ecosystem.



PETRONAS MPM Introduces Technology & Digital MPM (TDM) – A New Direction for Malaysia's Upstream Future

On 19 May, MOGSC had the privilege of attending a briefing by PETRONAS MPM on the establishment of its new Technology & Digital MPM (TDM) department, signalling a strategic move to further embed technology and digitalisation at the core of Malaysia's upstream oil and gas sector.

Led by Ts. Shahril Mokhtar (AMIMechE), the formation of TDM reflects a clear organisational shift – elevating technology, digitalisation, artificial intelligence, and data analytics from supporting roles to key enablers of industry growth, operational excellence, sustainability, and competitiveness.

During the briefing, several key strategic ambitions were highlighted:

- Advancing Malaysia towards and beyond the 2 million boepd production target.
- Reducing time to first hydrocarbon through faster, smarter, and more integrated delivery models.
- Developing a digitally enabled regulatory ecosystem powered by data and AI.
- Strengthening Malaysia's positioning as a regional OGSE and technology hub.

A key emphasis was also placed on the transition towards an “agentic AI” future, where autonomous systems support and enhance decision-making processes while maintaining human oversight and control. This direction reflects a bold step forward in shaping a more intelligent and adaptive upstream ecosystem.

For the OGSE community, the briefing provides important strategic clarity. As PETRONAS accelerates its digital and technology agenda, it becomes increasingly critical for industry players to understand this direction and align their capabilities accordingly to remain competitive and relevant in the evolving landscape.

In line with these developments, MOGSC will be inviting Ts. Shahril Mokhtar to further brief members on the TDM initiative and its implications for the industry. Further details will be announced in due course.

On 25 June, in conjunction with SOGCE 2026, MOGSC held an engagement session with the Labuan Chamber of Commerce (LCC) at the Sabah International Convention Centre (SICC), Kota Kinabalu.

The session provided a valuable platform for both organisations to strengthen ties, exchange perspectives, and explore opportunities to support the continued growth of Malaysia's oil, gas, and energy services (OGSE) industry.

Led by President Tuan Haji Zahris Sham Abu Musa, the MOGSC delegation included Vice President Tuan Haji Mohd Azman Nasir, Honorary Secretary Ahmad Fairuz Yahaya, and MOGSC Office Bearers and EXCO members.

LCC was represented by Chairman Ts. Daniel Doughty FCILT, APR, Head of the Oil & Gas Bureau Haji Masnahwi Nawe, and Treasurer Erich Nicholas.

MOGSC also shared its role in representing more than 600 corporate and associate members across Malaysia's OGSE value chain, while highlighting its efforts to enhance member visibility, strengthen industry collaboration, and serve as a trusted voice for the sector. The engagement concluded positively, with both organisations expressing their commitment to deeper collaboration and identifying areas of mutual interest to support the advancement of Malaysia's oil, gas, and energy industry.



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Collaboration is often the fastest way to accelerate progress

As part of our First 100 Days commitment, the The Malaysian Oil, Gas & Energy Services Council (MOGSC) team recently met with the Malaysia Petroleum Resources Corporation (MPRC) team to share our priorities, aspirations and key areas of focus for the 2026–2028 term.

The engagement provided a valuable platform for both organisations to exchange perspectives, discuss ongoing initiatives and explore opportunities to strengthen collaboration in support of the Malaysian Oil, Gas and Energy Services (OGSE) ecosystem.

It was a productive and encouraging engagement, particularly as we saw strong alignment between MOGSC's priorities and MPRC's ongoing efforts. The discussions covered several important areas, including regional and international expansion, talent development, homegrown technology initiatives through

Joint Industry Projects (JIPs), industry-academia collaboration, as well as access to industry funding.

We also discussed the importance of creating stronger platforms for Malaysian OGSE companies to develop their capabilities, scale their businesses and compete more effectively in regional and international markets. Through closer collaboration, there was an opportunity to connect existing initiatives, leverage each organisation's strengths and create greater value for industry players.

The encouraging part was that we were not starting from scratch. Both MPRC and MOGSC had already been driving initiatives across many of these areas, providing a strong foundation for deeper collaboration and greater impact. The meeting also highlighted opportunities to complement one another's efforts, avoid duplication and work towards shared outcomes for the industry.



Strengthening Engagement with PETRONAS Group Procurement

The Malaysian Oil, Gas & Energy Services Council (MOGSC) had a productive meeting with the Vice President of Group Procurement (GP), PETRONAS, to introduce the new EXCO lineup and share our aspirations for the 2026–2028 term.

The discussion focused on several key industry priorities, particularly payment-related challenges. Among the areas explored were mechanisms to better protect payments to subcontractors, the incorporation of payment performance into contractors' performance reviews, and ways to reduce delays in invoice verification to accelerate payment cycles.

We also discussed In-Country Value (ICV), where PETRONAS reaffirmed that local content considerations remained embedded within every tender strategy. On the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP), we exchanged views on the importance of broader industry briefings and awareness.

Talent development was another key topic, particularly how activities outlined in the PAO could be translated into clearer workforce demand projections to support future workforce planning and talent development initiatives. Most importantly, both sides agreed on the importance of maintaining regular dialogue, providing constructive feedback and working towards practical, win-win solutions for the industry. We were encouraged by PETRONAS' commitment to continue working closely with MOGSC in addressing industry challenges and supporting the sustainable growth of Malaysia's OGSE ecosystem.

It was a very constructive engagement held in an informal atmosphere, which allowed for frank discussions and a free flow of ideas. While there were differing perspectives on certain issues, we recognised that progress could only be achieved through open communication, mutual understanding and a shared commitment to finding solutions that benefited both the industry and the nation.

Building the Future of OGSE Talent Through Strategic Collaboration

On 6 July 2026, we had the opportunity to Talent Development was highlighted as the fourth pillar of the key priorities for The Malaysian Oil, Gas & Energy Services Council (MOGSC) for this term.

We had the opportunity to sit down with the Centre for Advanced Professional and Executive Education (CAPE), UTP, to explore potential areas of collaboration in developing the capabilities of Malaysian OGSE players.

A particularly interesting initiative discussed was CAPE's Vendor Development Programme a series of microcredential courses designed to help SMEs strengthen their business fundamentals, commercial capabilities and operational readiness.

On 21 July 2026, the MOGSC President was invited by TVETMARA Kemaman (MARA Oil & Gas College) to deliver the industry remarks at CONNECT @ MOGC 2026.

In his remarks, he highlighted three key areas where industry and academia could collaborate more closely:

- Business & Industry Capability through initiatives such as teaching factories and technical services.
- Talent Development through certification, upskilling and reskilling.
- Innovation through technology demonstrations and industry challenge projects.

The Malaysian Oil, Gas & Energy Services Council (MOGSC) remained committed to playing its part in bridging the wider OGSE industry with MOGC and creating more opportunities for meaningful collaboration. It was further emphasised that such commitments should be monitored and evaluated periodically to ensure that tangible outcomes were achieved and that talent development objectives remained on track.

As Sabah progresses towards its Energy Roadmap 2040 aspirations, achieving sustainable growth will require a balanced approach that addresses current industry workforce demands while developing a strong and capable pipeline of local talent for the future.

Navigating Integrity Risks in an Evolving Business Environment

We were honoured to have been invited to represent The Malaysian Oil, Gas & Energy Services Council (MOGSC) as one of the panelists at the Contractors & Partners N.A.V.I.G.A.T.E. Summit 2026, alongside fellow PETRONAS leaders.

The event began with all participants taking the Corruption Free Pledge – a simple yet powerful reminder that integrity was everyone's responsibility.

During the panel session, “Navigating Integrity Risks in an Evolving Business Environment,” we shared a message that was particularly important for SMEs, based on our experience and observations.

Many SMEs viewed integrity policies, Codes of Ethics and Codes of Conduct as frameworks meant primarily for large corporations. We saw them differently.

These frameworks were not only about compliance; they also served to protect organisations and their people when faced with difficult situations or pressure to compromise on what was right. Having clear policies and guidelines made it easier for companies and their employees to say no when the answer should be no.

We also shared the belief that integrity was not a cost to business. In fact, integrity paid. While it might not always deliver immediate returns, it built trust over time, strengthened reputations and created new opportunities. Companies generally preferred to work with partners they could trust, and trust was built through consistent ethical conduct.

As the industry continued to evolve, technologies, markets and business models changed. However, the value of integrity remained constant.



CyberSecure 360: Turning Cybersecurity Compliance into Competitive Advantage

For Malaysia's Oil, Gas & Energy Services and Equipment (OGSE) industry, cybersecurity is no longer simply an IT issue. Increasingly, it is becoming a question of business resilience, trust – and ultimately, the ability to continue winning work.

It was against this backdrop that the Malaysian Oil, Gas & Energy Services Council (MOGSC), through its Energy Transition, ESG & Cybersecurity Working Group, organised CyberSecure 360: Turning Compliance into Competitive Advantage.

The programme brought together representatives from government, industry, cybersecurity agencies, PETRONAS and OGSE companies to address a growing concern among service providers: What does cybersecurity compliance actually mean for an OGSE company, and how prepared are we for the requirements that are coming?

From IT Requirement to Business Requirement. Cybersecurity has traditionally been viewed as the responsibility of an organisation's IT department. That perception is rapidly becoming outdated.

Today, almost every part of an OGSE company is digitally connected. Engineering data, commercial information, project documentation, procurement systems, employee records, cloud applications and communications platforms all form part of an increasingly interconnected digital ecosystem.

More importantly, OGSE companies do not operate in isolation. We are part of the wider supply chains of PETRONAS, Petroleum Arrangement Contractors (PACs), operators, EPC contractors and other major clients.

A cybersecurity weakness within one supplier can therefore create exposure far beyond that individual organisation.

This changes the conversation fundamentally. For OGSE companies, the question is no longer simply: "How secure is our IT system?" It is increasingly: "Can our customers trust us with their data, systems and operations?" Compliance Is Becoming Part of Market Access. Malaysia's cybersecurity landscape is also evolving.

The introduction of the Cyber Security Act 2024 (Act 854) represents an important development in strengthening the country's national cybersecurity governance framework, particularly around National Critical Information Infrastructure (NCII).

For the energy industry, the implications extend throughout the supply chain.

Even where an OGSE company may not itself be designated as an NCII entity, companies working for organisations operating critical infrastructure should expect cybersecurity expectations to increasingly cascade down through procurement requirements, contractual obligations, vendor qualification and supply-chain assurance.

This is where cybersecurity begins to intersect directly with competitiveness.

An OGSE company may have excellent technical capabilities, competitive pricing and decades of industry experience. But if it cannot demonstrate adequate cybersecurity controls, the company could increasingly find itself unable to satisfy customer requirements.

In other words, cybersecurity readiness is becoming part of *market access*.

That was one of the central messages behind CyberSecure 360.

Demystifying the Compliance Journey

One of the objectives of CyberSecure 360 was also to make cybersecurity compliance more practical and understandable, particularly for SMEs.

Terms such as ISO/IEC 27001, information security management systems, risk assessments, vulnerability management and cybersecurity governance can initially appear daunting — especially for organisations without large dedicated cybersecurity teams

The discussions during CyberSecure 360 demonstrated that compliance should instead be approached as a journey.

Companies first need to understand what information and digital assets they possess, identify where their vulnerabilities and risks lie, establish appropriate policies and controls, and progressively build a culture where cybersecurity becomes part of normal business operations.

The experiences shared by OGSE companies during the programme were particularly important because they demonstrated that the journey is achievable.

There will inevitably be challenges — resources, cost, organisational buy-in, documentation and changes to established ways of working among them.

But cybersecurity maturity does not happen overnight. What matters is that companies start.

Beyond Compliance: Building Trust

Perhaps the more important conversation is what comes after compliance.

Certification and regulatory compliance should not become tick-box exercises.

The real objective is to create organisations that customers, employees and business partners can trust.

For an OGSE company, strong cybersecurity governance demonstrates that the organisation understands the responsibility that comes with handling its customers' information and participating in increasingly digital and interconnected projects.

That trust has commercial value.

Just as safety performance, quality management and ESG credentials have increasingly become differentiators within the energy supply chain, cybersecurity maturity has the potential to become another important indicator of organisational capability.

Companies that move early can therefore reposition cybersecurity expenditure from being viewed purely as a compliance cost into an investment in resilience, credibility and competitiveness.

Cyber Ready. Tender Ready.

The message emerging from CyberSecure 360 is ultimately straightforward.

Malaysia's OGSE industry has spent decades building technical capabilities that allow our companies to compete domestically and internationally. The next phase of that competitiveness will increasingly require companies to demonstrate not only what they can deliver, but also how securely and responsibly they operate.

Cybersecurity requirements will continue to evolve. Customer expectations will become more sophisticated, and digitalisation will only deepen the interconnectivity between operators and their supply chains.

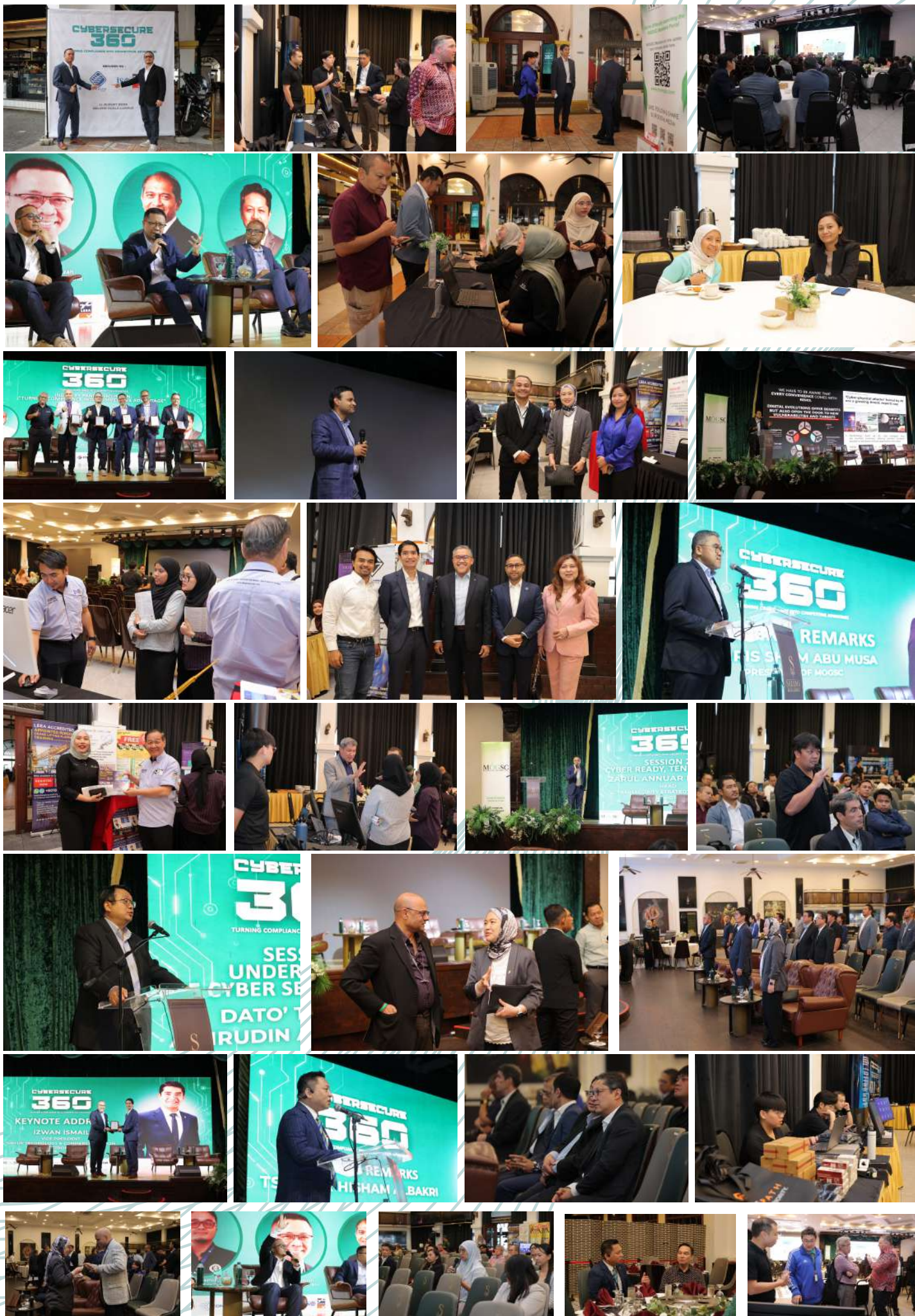
The OGSE industry therefore cannot afford to treat cybersecurity as something to address only when it becomes a tender requirement. By then, it may already be too late.

CyberSecure 360 was designed to start that conversation and, more importantly, encourage companies to begin their cybersecurity journey now.

Because in the emerging procurement environment, being technically capable may get a company to the starting line. Being compliant, resilient and trusted may determine whether it gets to compete. Cyber Ready. Tender Ready.

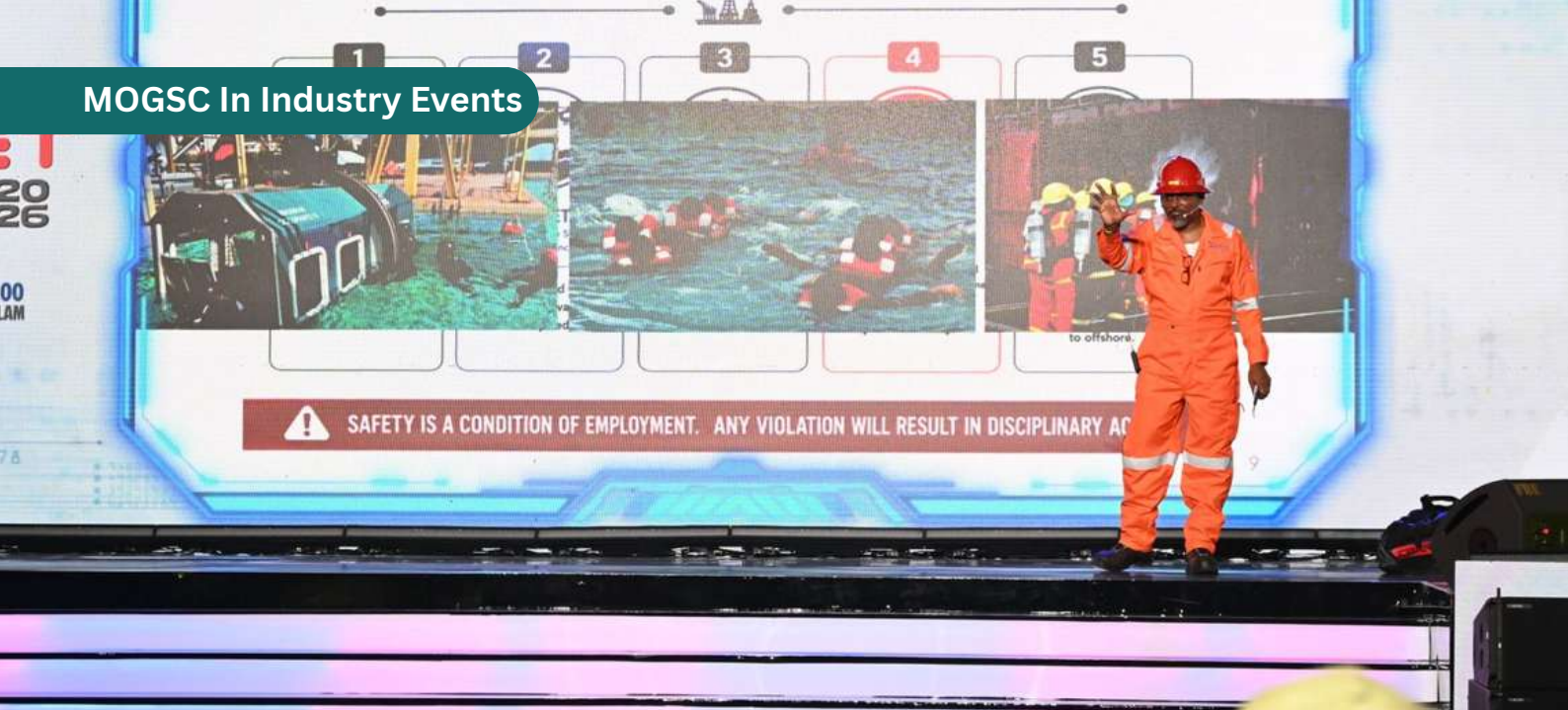

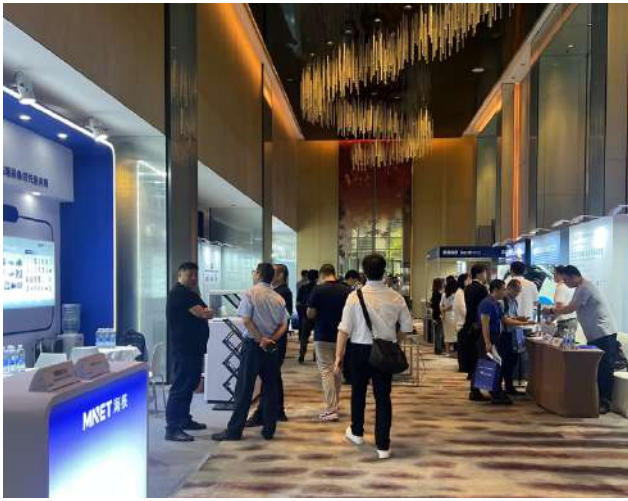

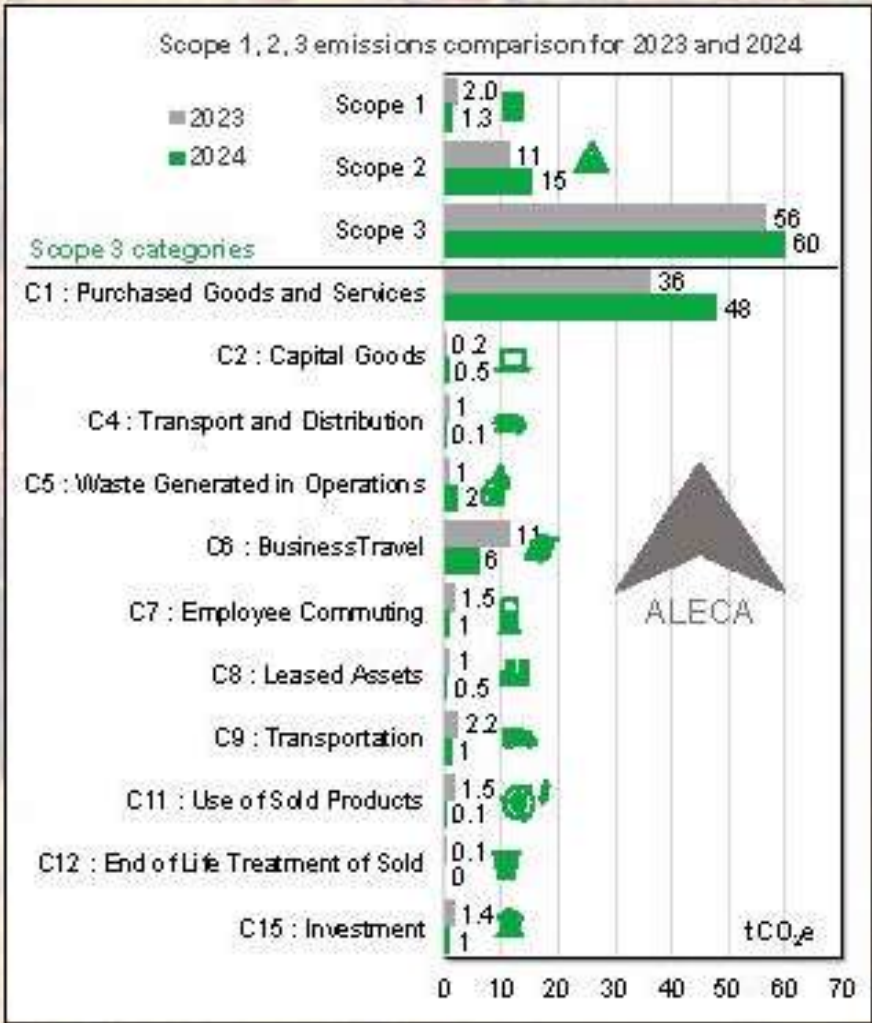
